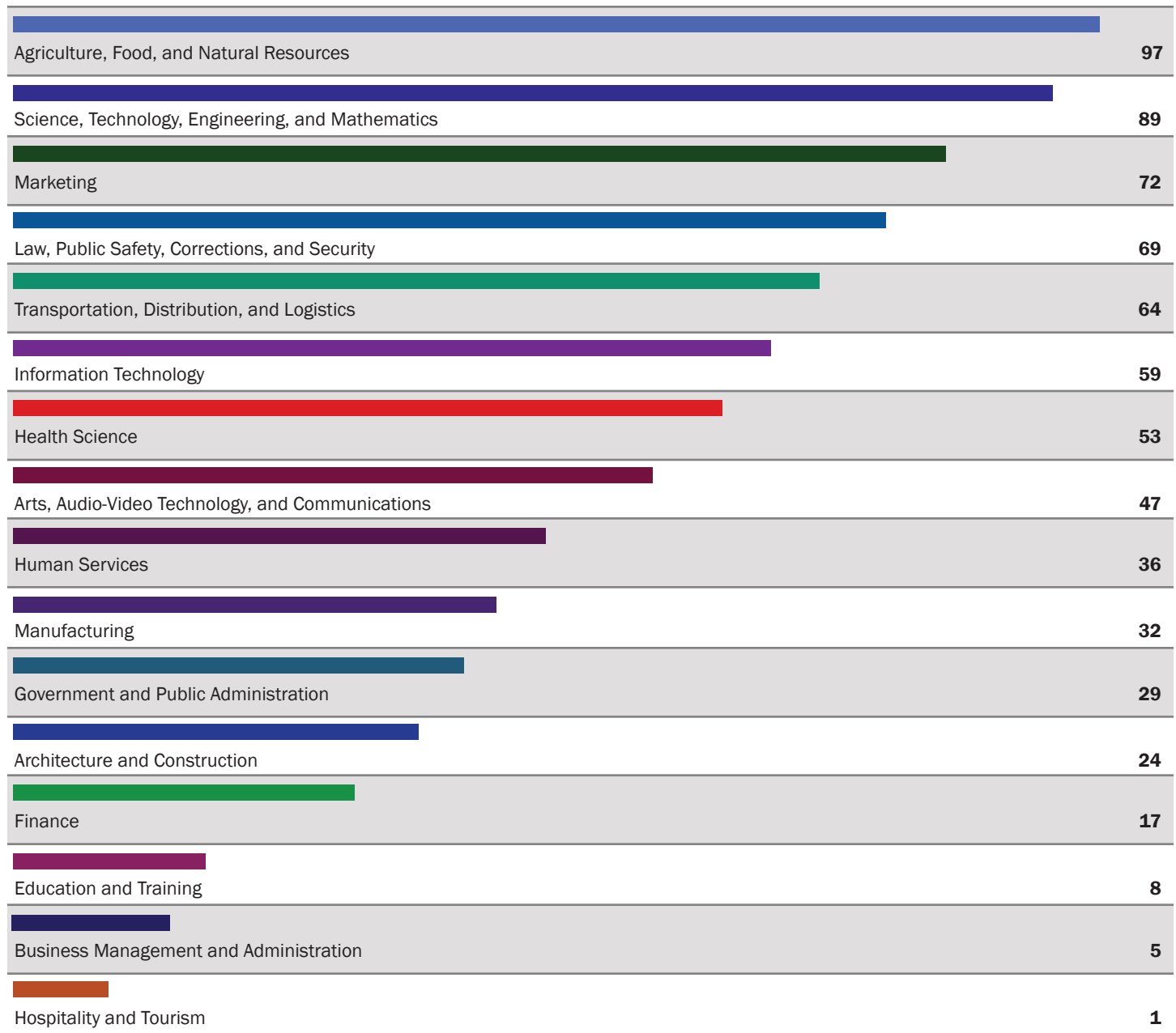


Career Interests

Interests are things that you enjoy doing. Jobs are divided into the 16 groups – called career clusters – below. Jobs are grouped in this way because they have similar characteristics. For example, all the jobs in the Human Services cluster are jobs for people who enjoy helping others.

Your *highest cluster* of interest is the one with the longest bar. Your cluster of least interest has the shortest bar and appears at the bottom of the graphic below. The number to the right of the bar tells you how strong your interest is compared to others. For example, if the number to the right of the bar is a 97, it means that 97 percent of students your age have less interest in this cluster than you do.



Top Person Matches

Person Matches are career stories of people who responded to the interest assessment very much like you did. These are real-life career stories of how people selected their career and what they do on a day-to-day basis at work. Person Matches are not meant to tell you what you should do after you graduate from high school. They are meant to help you learn about what other people who have interests like yours are doing at work. Below are the three Person Matches for each of your top five clusters.
